Long Branch, New Jersey was a resort town in the late 18th century, named for its location along a branch of the South Shrewsbury River. In the 19th century it was a "Hollywood" of the east, where some of the greatest theatrical performances were held. It was visited by presidents Chester A. Arthur, James A. Garfield, Ulysses S. Grant, Benjamin Harrison, Rutherford B. Hayes, William McKinley, and Woodrow Wilson. Seven Presidents Park, a park near the beach, is named in honor of their visits. The Church of the Presidents, where all seven worshipped, is the only structure left in Long Branch associated with them.

The Victorian Society in America, Northern New Jersey Chapter is pleased to present historian Jim Foley. Mr. Foley serves as the Historian for the Borough of Deal, NJ and as President of the Board of Trustees of the Long Branch Historical Museum aka The Church of the Presidents. Mr. Foley's presentation will focus on the history of the church: its building and surrounding community that attracted more US presidents than any other church outside of Washington, DC. The Victorian era of the Jersey Shore will also highlighted.

Many of the local streets bear the names of people that lived on them: Garfield, McKinley and Pullman. Even the name of Hollywood, California has its roots in Long Branch. Can't wait to learn more about this special town.
