The O'Fakes were a prominent African American family of musicians who in late 19th century Newark taught music and the socially graceful dances of the day in their Newark studio. They were founders of St. Phillips Episcopal parish in Newark (now merged with Trinity Cathedral) and their influence on regional culture is worthy of discussion and exploration.

Dr. Epps has been a leader devoted to public service throughout her career. She is President and CEO of 1804 Consultants, an organization dedicated to the advancement of educational and cultural organizations. She most recently served as President and CEO of the New Jersey Historical Society. Dr. Epps earned her Bachelor's Degree from Douglass College, her Master's from Seton Hall University, and completed her doctoral program at Drew Photo courtesy of the New


University.

5 Ideas for a Victorian St. Patrick's Day**

- 1. Attend an historic event. Did you know that the first St. Patrick's Day parade was in New York in 1762? A group of Irish men serving in the British army during the French and Indian War marched through the streets of New York City. Today, the largest parades are in Boston and New York. For a more intimate and authentically Victorian experience, visit the restored 1845 Cherry Hill Farmhouse in Falls Church, Virginia for a Celtic music concert.
- 2. **Eat meat.** Lots of meat. During the Victorian era, St. Patrick's Day was a religious holiday in Catholic Ireland, its atmosphere comparable to that of Thanksgiving in America. While the holy day fell in the middle of Lent, the Roman Catholic Church lifted restrictions against eating meat for the day so that Irish communities could celebrate their patron saint.
- 3. **Brush up that Irish accent** by reading great literature aloud. Some favorite Irish writers: <u>Dracula</u> by Bram Stoker, <u>The Importance of Being Earnest</u> by Oscar Wilde, <u>Pygmalion</u> by George Bernard Shaw (the only writer who won both a Nobel Prize and an Oscar for the same work, which was later adapted into the beloved musical <u>My Fair Lady</u>.
- 4. **Give greeting cards.** The Industrial Revolution transformed expensive, hand-made cards to mass-produced ephemera. Antique St. Patrick's Day cards today are affordable collectibles.
- 5. **Be grateful.** When one thinks of St. Patrick's Day in the Victorian era, one can't evade the Irish potato famine which lasted from 1845-1852, killing one million and forcing another million to leave their homeland. There's good reason to think of St. Patrick's Day as similar to Thanksgiving. As you feast on corned beef and cabbage, take a moment to be grateful for simple things like the freedom to enjoy goofy, green-dyed food with family and friends.

VSA/NNJ Board member, Nancy Cooper, will return to this year's schedule with a discussion of the history of cameo carving and its use in jewelry. She will draw on examples of shell cameos from the Victorian and Edwardian Eras as she describes the care of cameos; tips on dating and pricing of cameos and materials for mountings, such as gold, gold-filled,

silver, jet and brass.

Slides will illustrate the material presented and will be used as the central backdrop for the lecture.

Other materials, such as hard stone, coral, jet, lava stone, celluloid, gutta percha and glass, along with a history of each will also be included.

Nancy is a member of both the National and local chapter of the Victorian Society in America, the Morris County Historical Society and the Costume and Textile Society of New Jersey. She has served as a docent at Acorn Hall for 7 years and is involved in the National Historic Trust and the Association for Preservation of Civil War Sites.

Attendees are invited to bring examples from their own collections. A bibliography for further study will be offered.


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Lynn Vergano and Princess June Chao National Arts Club Awards Night March 2nd, 2017
